Since the class of 2022 largely didn't get to go abroad, here is a list of resources for creating your

own abroad experience after graduation! There are so many short term (paid!) opportunities that

it can seem overwhelming to know where to start. This blog will give an overview of what's out

there and link to more resources you can explore.

OPPORTUNITIES: Master List of Organizations

Masters Programs:

A great way to study abroad is by pursuing a masters overseas. Many schools are much more

affordable than higher education in America, and, since the university would sponsor your

student visa, you won't have to worry about navigating that process. Many countries offer

programs in English, and you can often find specialties you might not be able to pursue as easily

in America depending on your major. While many fellowships can get you to this point, it can

often be easier to get into these schools on your own merit compared to the competitiveness of a

fellowship (ie Oxford on your own merit compared to Oxford with a Rhodes Scholarship).

Things to think about:

What region of the world could bolster your learning? Is there an international connection

you already see in your coursework?

Is there a particular area of focus you want to study? What countries might specialize in

that area?

Is this program recognized in the USA? Check with employers/future higher education

schools if you have any doubts.

Fellowships:

"There is a fellowship for every single demographic and every single specialty" - Dr. Spencer

There are hundreds of fellowships out there to help fund your post-grad experience. Some are

identity-based or for a specific niche so keep that in mind when searching. Many fellowships

allow applicants for quite awhile after graduation so don't be deterred if you didn't apply during

your senior year - you still have time! Just note you will often need to be recommended by

Tulane, so it is a good idea to discuss with the Office of Fellowship Advising before graduation

if you are considering this for the future (link to Tulane fellowship office).

Teaching English:

There are both government and non-government sponsored English teaching programs abroad.

This can be a great way to not only practice and build your foreign language skills by meeting

locals but also engage in cultural exchange as you share your language and culture with your

students. While these are often unpaid, you will be provided a stipend and sometimes housing

but it varies by program so be sure to check what your specific program offers.

Volunteering:

Seeking to volunteer abroad can be really helpful to organizations doing important work to help communities. These programs are unpaid and sometimes even require you pay a small fee, so keep this in mind when considering the cost of your trip. These tend to also be very flexible on timing and offer a variety of options for both short-term and long-term trips.

Things to consider: Voluntourism can be really harmful to communities when done improperly. When researching programs, make sure to examine what the communities' needs are and how they are helped/hurt by the actions of these programs. It is important to volunteer in a way that is sustainable and puts the community needs over the needs of any foreigners coming in to help.

Leading Abroad Trips:

If you didn't get to go on an abroad program there is no reason you can't lead one! Build leadership experience while also traveling with a group of high school or college-age students. These trips are often run through schools or programs, so you often won't be responsible for securing your own visas and logistics will be sorted out for you by the provider.

Going on Abroad Trips:

If you really wanted the classic cohort undergrad abroad experience, worry not! There are many programs that offer similar trips for young adults after college focusing on a range of topics from volunteering to language practice, all focusing on immersion and cultural exchange supported by program staff.

Other:

Work away:

Work for room and board while traveling. Most opportunities are short-term, and you can have

flexibility over where you go and some control over what you do. Workaway can be great for

scoping out locations for grad school or other abroad opportunities before committing to a longer

period of time. You don't truly know what you are walking into until you get there, so the

opportunities could be hit or miss.

Au pair:

An au pair is like a live-in nanny and is a popular way to work abroad for either a summer or up

to a year. These positions don't tend to be well-paid but you do get food, housing, and a small

stipend. Au pair visas sometimes require you to take a full-time language course to fulfill the

requirements; therefore, you need to consider additional cost and scheduling conflicts associated

with that requirement.

MORE THINGS TO THINK ABOUT

The most important question when embarking on this journey is: What do you want to get out

of the experience, and which avenue will best meet your goals?

When planning time abroad is it essential to think about 3 major things:

1. Visas - how long are you planning to stay? Who can sponsor you? What are the

requirements for the country you are planning to travel to?

- 2. Cost consider what your budget will allow and if there are any funding opportunities from grants/fellowships/etc. If you plan to work abroad make sure to plan ahead and ensure your visa allows for this. Flights are often not covered so that is another personal expense you will need to cover.
- 3. Housing where will you live? Is this provided or another cost to consider?

Professional benefits:

While it can seem scary to not go straight into the workforce, going abroad can actually provide many important skills that employers look for and is a great talking point in interviews. Not only will you build important skills for navigating life, but many have direct applications to essential soft skills that will help your career as well.

1. International experience

a. In a globalized world, more and more employers are seeking employees that are comfortable moving abroad. Showing this willingness and having experience makes you a more competitive hire.

2. Resilience

a. Given everything we have been through in undergrad, we all probably have this skill quite developed... But that being said, going abroad will continue to be a challenge in the future as we navigate the world with COVID-19. Resilience will continue to be a key skill to nurture and build.

3. Independence

- a. Moving away from your family and familiar life requires a high level of independence. Living on your own in a new city will push you out of your comfort zone and foster independence.
- 4. Willingness to seek out challenges
 - a. Taking a year to pursue a passion comes with many obstacles that you will face.
 Overcoming challenges tests the bounds of what you think you can do and develops new skills (also this is always an interview question).

Just because you may have missed the opportunity to study abroad in undergrad doesn't mean the world isn't at your feet at graduation, and I hope you take advantage of it!
